LETTER FROM THE MONSIGNOR


answering, said to the women: Fear not you; for I know that you seek JESUS who was crucified. He is not here, for he is risen, as he said. Come, and see the place where the Lord was laid. And going quickly, tell ye his disciples that he is risen: and behold he will go before you into Galilee; there you shall see him. Lo, I have foretold it to you.

- S. Matthew 28:5 - 7

E is Risen, Alleluía! As He said! Alleluía! Christ our Risen Lord and King always keeps His promises; most especially the promise of His most glorious resurrection from the dead. His resurrection is not only the fulfilment of His promise for Himself, but for us all: we too, if we believe and baptized, shall gloriously with Him on the last day. S. Paul reminds us: that all we, who are baptized in CHRIST FESUS, are baptized in His death? For we are buried together with Him by baptism into death; that as Christ is risen from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we also may walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His

death, we shall be also in the likeness of His resurrection (Romans 6:3-5).

By dying to sin and living in the grace of Christ we becoming partakers of that same glorious resurrection. Not just spiritually but actually. Too many people today believe the resurrection that "spiritual" and that there will not be a physical resurrection of our bodies. This of course is error (and heresy). Again, S. Paul teaching to the Romans: And if the Spirit of Him that raised up FESUS from the dead, dwell in you; He that raised up FESUS CHRIST from the dead, shall quicken also your mortal bodies, because of His Spirit that dwelleth in you (Romans 8:11).



The Son of Man must suffer many things, and be rejected by the ancients and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and the third day rise again. (S. Luke 9:22)

In a society such as ours, that places such emphasis on the physical, I am surprised that even (so-called) "believers" do not understand that the resurrection will be physical – we say it in every Creed of the Church: Et exspécto resurrectionem mortuorum. Et vitam venturi saéculi. Amen.

The bodily resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ fulfils all of His promises to us; overcoming the death of sin, which gains for us eternal life in that same Lord! Once more, our dearest S. Paul: Behold, I tell you a mystery. We shall all indeed rise again: but we shall not all be changed. In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall rise again incorruptible: and we shall be changed (I Corinthians 15:51 -52).

We must cling to this truth, we must believe in this promise.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

There is something that I have never been able to understand about Purgatory: If understand correctly, Purgatory has two purposes, to purify the soul of impurities so she may enter Heaven (as nothing impure can enter Heaven), and to endure the temporal punishment still due from her sins on earth. If a soul obtains a plenary indulgence at the time of death, and no temporal punishment needs to be served, then the soul can enter Heaven directly. what about the impurities that need to be purified so the soul can enter Heaven? The impurities do not go away with the plenary indulgence. Does the soul still need to go to Purgatory have to her impurities purified? Or does God purify the soul with a word from Him?

If I understand correctly, which I certainly may not, it seems as if we have a cloudy view of what Purgatory is for and how it works. I certainly have a cloudy view of it. I would appreciate anything that you could tell me to clear up this matter. In Heaven we will have the true answers.

This is a very good question, that, alas, too many people over complicate. When one passes from this world he either dies in a state of grace (free from mortal sin) or in a

state of sin. Those who die in sin are condemned to hell (their Particular Judgment) and their soul goes straight there. Those who die in a state of grace have saved their souls and go to heaven. Now, let's spend a few moments explaining this:

- 1) They may be in a state of grace because they HAVE NOT committed a mortal sin since their last Sacramental Confession;
- 2) They may have attained Perfect Contrition at the moment of death, which means they have a true and complete sorrow for their sins committed and even though they have not been able to make a Sacramental Confession, God forgives their actual committed sin.

Here is where the Mercy and Justice of God comes in:

- 1) Purgatory is a state where the soul, which has died in grace, can "pay back" what is still owed to God's justice; this is especially the case for one who dies in Perfection Contrition and has yet to repay (do penance) God's justice.
- 2) Purgatory is also for those souls that have received Sacramental Absolution in Confession, but still owe God's justice for those confessed sins that have been forgiven.


Finally, an Indulgence can be either partial or plenary (full/complete): a PARTIAL indulgence removes some of the time that an individual still "owes" God's justice; whereas a PLENARY indulgence means that individual at the moment they have gained the plenary indulgence would enter straight into heaven. Now if one sins after receiving a

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plenary indulgence they may gain another indulgence (partial or plenary) to work off that new "debt."

I hope that simplifies this for you.
