LETTER FROM THE MONSIGNOR

At the Station keeping stood the mournful Mother weeping, close to Jesus to the last! — Stabat Mater Dolorosa

UR LADY **OF** SORROWS, ever faithful to God, her Son, remains with Him even in the midst of His suffering and shame upon the Cross, the Tree of Woe. Like her, we must never shrink from the Cross of Christ, we must never flinch or look away from His visage. Behold the wood of the Cross upon which hung the Saviour of the world! Let us take her example to heart and follow her as she follows Him.

As we are in the midst of our Lenten Observance it is important that we keep our focus upon Our Lord and the mystery of our salvation wrought by His Passion; and so I offer for your consideration these three pious practices:

- Recitation of the Stations of the Cross
- Pious Works
- ❖ Spiritual Reading

One of the most ancient of meditations and prayers of the Holy Church, the **Stations** of the Cross allows us to meditate upon Our Lord's journey to Calvary. If one were to devoutly pray this beautiful exercise every Friday (or even daily) during Lent, especially close to 3:00 pm, he would find

himself closely united with the Saviour. The sharing of the suffering of Our Lord is an especially intimate and holy time, and will bring much grace and spiritual profit one's soul.

The performance of Pious Works, especially if the correspond to the Corporal Acts of Mercy, which are feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, harbour the habourless, visit the sick, ransom the captive and bury the dead. These are found in S. Matthew's Gospel (25:34 – 46) and the failure to perform these lead will on to eternal damnation (ibid)!



Daily Spiritual Reading, also known as the Lectio Divina, is a wonderful way through scriptural and spiritual reading, meditation and prayer promote a greater union of one's soul with God. The saints have all employed this method study, meditation and prayer. If one reads the scriptural accounts of Our Lord's Passion, or

recommended pious reading, then contemplates what one has read and then makes a prayer to God predicated upon the subject of that reading the souls grows and grace multiplies. Some excellent books are The Four Last Things: Death, Judgement, Hell, Heaven by Fr. Martin Von Cochem, OSF, and Lenten Hymns bv Fr. Adrian Fortescue.

These next few weeks affords us the opportunity to stand before the Cross and partake in His great suffering and sacrifice. Let us comfort Him and His Blessed Mother by remaining faithful to the end, for in bearing witness to His Passion we may join in the glory and power of His Resurrection. We must never turn away from the Lord, we must never fear loving Him and proclaiming Him in this time and place, for He warns us: For he that shall be ashamed of Me, and of My words, in this adulterous and sinful generation: the Son of Man also will be ashamed of him, when He shall come in the glory of His Father with the holy angels (S. Mark 8:38).

I always thought that Our Lord's mother was one of the women going to anoint His early Sunday body on morning. But, I think you said that she was not one of the women mentioned. But, if she was not; why not?

◆Thank you for your The •question; Holv Scriptures are *quite* clear in this regard: S. Joseph of Arimathea petitions Pilate for the body of the Lord and when He is taken down from the Cross, with the help of S. Nicodemus, He is wrapped in "fine new linen and spices as was the custom of the Jews" and put into an unused tomb in a nearby garden (cf. S. Matthew 27:56 ff., S. Mark 15:46 ff., S. Luke 23:54 ff., and S. John 19:38 ff.) The women mentioned in attendance at the burial of Our Lord are S. Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Joseph (the other Mary) and Salome, except in the Gospel account of S. John where the women are not mentioned by name.

In the devotion of the Via Crucis, or Way of the Cross, we pray that Our Blessed Lady arranged her Son's body in the Sepulcher "with her own hands."

immediate This was the preparation for burial because it was the great Passover and at sundown ALL labour must cease, so the Lord's body was prepared with haste, albeit with great reverence.

The scriptural accounts of the return for even more reverence and additional preparation take place three days later, "on the first day of the week", i.e.: Sunday. In these accounts we that read the Marys' (Magdalene, mother of James and Joseph and Salome) return and find the tomb already empty (cf. S. Matthew 28 ff., S. Mark 16 ff., S. Luke 24 ff., S. John 20 ff.). They are simply returning to do more: and they are all, except the Magdalene, blood relatives of the Lord. The Blessed Mother already took care of her Son on the day of His Passion and Death.


